Mr. Bailey called the meeting to order at 8:16am. He began by welcoming Senator Blumenthal and thanking him for all that he does for the state and region.

U.S. Senator Richard Blumenthal was originally sworn in on January 5, 2011. He is serving his third term as a United States Senator from the State of Connecticut.

Senator Blumenthal began by stating he was proud to be a friend of TWP and admires the impact that The WorkPlace has had on many individuals lives. He thinks the work that TWP does is central to the mission that he has and he will be fighting for more work training and skills that TWP provides to individuals. He recently had a meeting with top officials at the Pentagon who are tremendously enthusiastic about work done at places like Electric Boat and Sikorsky. The concern is if CT and the country will have the skilled workers to perform the tasks necessary for National Security.

Senator Blumenthal spoke about the following topics:

- Housing and Economic Development
- The PACT Act for Veterans
- Childcare being the key to unlocking the labor force and how child tax credits will help parents get back out into the workforce
- Financial Services industry changes
- Job market and training skills

He concluded by thanking everyone for their kind words and all the hard work done over the years.

#### **President's Report**

Mr. Carbone began by introducing State Representative Rachel Khana 149<sup>th</sup> District in Greenwich. Representative Khana is a member of the appropriations committee and other committees in the general assembly.

Mr. Carbone then proceeded to give a tribute to Joe Bertolino who is leaving his position as President of Southern Connecticut State University. He is taking a position at Stockton University in Galloway, New Jersey.

A tribute was given to the CEO of Career Resources (CRI), Scott Wilderman. CRI has met the needs of returning citizens who are top priority. They have done this by being innovative and searching for new ways and ideas. The Community Investment Fund is giving \$4,536,250 to "Bridge on Main" in Bridgeport. This award will assist the renovation of 1085-1095 Main Street to facilitate a suite of programs designed to help level the playing field for returning citizens and justice impacted individuals.

#### **Hiring and Workplace Trends:**

- **Tight labor supply will continue to impact hiring-** The market is experiencing a persistent gap between employer demand for new hires and the supply of candidates. The hiring difficulties seen today will continue.
- Remote work is here to stay The pandemic caused a shift to widespread remote work which will be a permanent feature of the labor market. Though many jobs can't be done remotely, employers s are beginning to offer a more flexible approach.
- Pay is top of mind for job seekers- Compensation is key consideration for job seekers
  driven by a cost of living crisis. For jobs where remote work isn't feasible, flexibility
  around hours and shift patterns matter. Other facets matter too including: health
  insurance, retirement account and other benefits.
- **Unconventional labor pools-** Exploring alternative sources of labor is required as well as leveraging remote work options, keeping mature workers engaged, job sharing, and expanding opportunities for people with disabilities.

<u>Unemployed Workers and Open Jobs:</u> There are many jobs with not enough workers to fill them. If every unemployed person found a job we would still have 23,000 open jobs. Nationally it would be 4 million open jobs.

<u>Labor Force Participation:</u> The labor force is the number of people who are either working or actively looking for work. Several factors have come together to cause the ongoing shortage:

- Increased Savings
- Early Retirements
- Access to Childcare
- New Businesses

**Missing Workers-** There would be 32,500 more CT workers today if the labor force participation rate was the same as in February 2020.

<u>Labor Shortage</u>: The structural labor shortage could have a profound impact on our economy and society. For consumers it could mean delays, higher prices and not being able to access goods and services. In 2023 the working age population is expected to grow by 400,000. The expectation is a decline for the following two year.

<u>Health CareerRx Academy:</u> The Office for Workforce Strategy awarded TWP \$7,500,000 over two years to train 760 individuals across CT. Two new hires and three candidates are in the process for Case Management, Concierge and Employer Relations.

In February, orientation sessions were held for the Community Health Workers program and for people referred from the Career Connect portal. TWP has received 190 referrals from Career Connect to date.

Training is planned in partnership with the Connecticut State and Community College (CSCU).

<u>RemoteWorks:</u> Congressman Himes secured \$1 million in federal funds for remote work training. The Office for Workforce Strategy awarded \$669,000 to prepare people for remote work. TWP is preparing to launch by recruiting staff, exploring partnerships such as LinkedIn Learning with over 1,000 courses and meeting with other workforce boards and community partners to prepare referral sources.

<u>Platform to Employment (P2E):</u> Mr. Carbone noted that this program has had continued success. The most recent cohort has an Average wage of \$26.02 and average salary of \$54,122. On March 27, another cohort is set to launch with 50 individuals.

<u>Platform to Employment (Re-entry)</u>: This program has been in operation for four years. This program has served over 500 people, the rate of employment to full-time employment is currently 72%.

<u>MaturityWorks:</u> TWP is proud to announce we've expanded to Vermont. The state of Vermont awarded a 15-month \$527,000 contract to operate the Senior Community Service Employment Program. Operations begin April 1 and will complement our activities in other states serving over 700 individuals that are 50 years of age or older.
