#### **President's Report**

<u>SWCT Companies Ranked on the FORTUNE 500 List of Largest Corporations:</u> Fortune 500 is an important status for a private business sector to reach. In total, this year's Fortune 500 companies represent two-thirds of the U.S gross domestic product with about \$18 trillion in revenues.


<u>Mixed Economic Data:</u> Gross Domestic Product increased by 1.3% during Q1 2023. The size of the economy is expanding and generating more production and income.

Job gains continue at a healthy pace. Total U.S. nonfarm payroll employment increased by 339,000 in May. Nationally, the unemployment rate was 3.7% in May.

Why the Labor Shortage could be here to stay: More Americans are getting older, fertility rates are declining and the increase in life expectancy is expected to lead to a drop in the percentage of the working age population. Many older Americans are working longer than ever but still retire at some point. This demographic trend was in place prior to Covid-19 but was accelerated by the pandemic, which pushed many older workers into retirement.

The job market is strong and "prime age" workers are indeed working. The labor force participation rate among those aged 25-53 is now 83.3% which is slightly higher from February 2020.

<u>Our Challenge:</u> We must focus on upskilling incumbent workers and creating alternative work situations for mature workers. A growing need for labor has had employers make major adjustments in wages, benefits and workplace flexibility- but they cannot find enough workers.

<u>Health Career Academy (HCA):</u> U.S. Senator Richard Blumenthal, U.S. Representative Rosa Delauro and Jim Himes announced \$2,997,368 million in federal funding for The WorkPlace to train nurses and create equitable opportunities for frontline healthcare professionals. This leverages \$7,500,000 awarded from the Office of Workforce Strategy to train 760 individuals across CT. In addition, the U.S. Department of

Health and Human Services also awarded TWP \$2.9 million to train and place 300 Community Healthcare Workers.

HCA will help individuals enter the healthcare industry and support them through a career progression to middle-skill positions, such as LPNs and high-skill positions such as RNs.

- Attended nine outreach events this quarter
- 238 individuals attended information sessions
- 928 applications received across CT
- 311 Completed Eligibility
- 132 individuals have begun training

#### **Board Business:**

A motion was made and seconded to accept minutes from the March 17, 2023 Board of Directors meeting. Motion carried.

<u>Guest Speaker:</u> Mr. Bailey welcomed our guest speaker, Representative Matt Ritter. Mr. Ritter serves as the Speaker of the Connecticut House of Representatives.

Guest speaker Matt Ritter began by thanking TWP for allowing him to be a speaker, he appreciates the work that TWP does, the training TWP provides, the lives TWP impacts. He shared that TWP graduation is a unique experience for an individual. He opened the floor to any questions and spoke about the following topics:

- •The significance of the outcomes of the most recent legislative session
- Worker shortage
- Mental Health
- Affordable Housing
- •Transportation improvement for the state

Representative Ritter discussed during the recent session he was proud of HB-5001 and the work that was done with families their children and individuals with intellectual and physical disabilities. He shared that the bill passed 151 to 0 in about five minutes and he has never seen anything like that. This legislative session addressed funding, how people age out with housing waiting lists and Increasing the age where kids can stay in school until 22 years old based on their birth dates. Every session has its positive moments and in terms of voting rights it was the most successful session he has been a part of.

He concluded by thanking everyone, he appreciates the kind words, hard work and dedication.

<u>Adjournment:</u> Mr. Bailey called for a motion to adjourn. There being no further discussion, the meeting was adjourned at 9:24am. The next Board meeting will be held on September 15,2023.
